

Contrary Creek, Mineral, VA ---Gold, Garnets, Magnetite and Pyrite – July 22, 2023 by Dave Lines



July is summer and it is supposed to be hot. The practical solution to staying cool on a summer rock trip is to do it in the water. Gold panning in Contrary Creek fits the bill. Yes, the water quality in the creek is less than ideal. It stains everything a shade of orange. Many of the rocks are orange, too. But not to worry because most can be cleaned with Iron Out. And the rocks you dig up are usually not stained anyway. But I am getting ahead of myself.

We were supposed to meet at 9:00 am, but several folks were late due to various reasons (one person ended up in Culpeper at the 4029 Zachary Taylor Highway address because he forgot to add "Mineral, VA" to his search.) Our safety brief was sporadic. All nine of us (Renee, Rich, Dave, John S., John M., Kenny and Lara, Mike S., and Richard T.) stayed safe.

Four (4) of us carpooled in Rich's truck – that had saved three (3) vehicles

from each wasting gas for the 75 miles each way from my house to Contrary Creek. Carpooling is more fun anyway because we get to know each other better during the trip.

The weather was actually a bit cooler than it had been during the previous week. Temperatures started off around 70 degrees and rose to the low 80's. Very pleasant.

The creek itself was about the same as always. The water level was relatively low and there were a lot of pine trees that had fallen over into the creek up stream of the RT 522 bridge.

We spread out, each person picked a spot, and started digging small holes and panning the gravel. I was fortunate — I hit a layer of black gravel about a foot deep that John S. said looked good for gold because it was virgin gravel that had not been disturbed in a long time. He was right --- I found six (6) small pieces (specs) of gold in my first two (2) pans. Eureka! I also found small magnetite crystals (octahedron shaped), and small almandine garnets (dodecahedron shaped). Also, I found a few pieces of massive magnetite (proven by testing with a magnet) and one piece of mica schist with a small garnet embedded.







At 10:30 am, I took a break and walked around to check with each of our group and take some pictures. John S. was the clear leader of gold panning. He had panned over 100 pieces of fine gold compared to my five (5) pieces. Wow. Members of the Tidewater Club had also arrived and were panning for gold and garnets immediately downstream of the bridge.

I returned to my prospect hole about 11:30 am, and invited several others to dig for gold there, but the gold layer seemed to have petered out. When John S. left, he offered me his hole, which I tried for both gold and for garnets. Not much luck there either due to a large amount of pyrite clogging up my gold pan each time. A suggestion for finding garnets: Don't use a small mesh classifier to sift the gravel before you pan it. If you do use the 1/4" classifier, all garnets larger than 1/4" will be excluded from your pan.

The Tidewater club members left about noon. Our group mostly left at 1:00 pm. The four of us in Rich's truck remained until 2 pm. We filled in all our holes and left the place looking pretty good. Just as we were leaving a family of four (dad, mom and 2 kids) arrived and started panning. About the same time, three guys arrived

and started panning. It has become a popular place to find some rocks.



After we departed for home, we passed a large area that looked like it had been recently timbered. We noticed that there was a lot of bare ground – always a good place to check for rocks. Since there were no "Posted" signs, we turned around and drove onto the property to see if there was anything there worth collecting. If there was, we planned to track down the owner and get permission to collect there another time. As it turned out, the ground was covered in garnets up to ½" in size that had weathered out of the soil. Now we will have to find the owner and try to get

permission to collect there. It looked real promising.

Overall, we had so much fun, I decided to hold another trip to the creek on August 5th. Hope you can sign up and join us.

A Second Visit to Contrary Creek by Dave Lines

When Rich, Jill and I arrived at 8:40 am, Renee and her granddaughter, Haven, were already waiting for us. I showed them some of the "sample specimens" so they would know what to look for. We were scheduled to meet at 9:00 am, but folks straggled in at different times until after 9:30 am. (Note: Unfortunately, when this happens, the trip leader has a difficult time giving a safety brief to everyone. In fact, it becomes impossible.) The last to arrive made the error of not adding "Mineral, VA" to the street address I had provided. This person drove to the exact same highway address in "Culpeper" --- many miles in the wrong direction. Lots of unnecessary extra miles. Fortunately, the trip leader was able to turn them around and guide them back to the correct location --- all by cell phone. Such are the challenges of a Trip Leader. I gave up trying to give the safety briefing to everyone. Everyone finally made it to the meeting location and down the steep path to the creek. Our group had 13 people ---Rich, Dave, Jill, Renee, Haven, Diane and her 2 grandsons Kolton and Kyler, Kurt and Sue, Alton and Teresa, and Katie.

At about 9:45 am, I finally took my gear down to the creek and held an impromtu training session with a "magnet" --- showing several of our people how a magnet could definitively identify

magnetite which is plentiful at this location. Then I showed them pyrite --- "fool's gold" - -- also abundant here.



Rich had dug a shallow hole and found gray clay – usually a good indicator (in this location) of gold and loose garnets. I put some in a gold pan and panned it out – but no gold and no garnets. I think the clay was too sandy --- needs to be primarily sticky, gray clay.



I checked on the rest of our attendees. All were busy having fun finding rocks. I then went to the spot on the gravel bar where I had found gold two weeks before. I dug down about 18 inches until I

found a layer of black or dark colored gravel that was tightly compressed - because it had never been disturbed in a very long time. I showed others what I was doing and then I filled a 5-gallon bucket full of the gravel. Then I took it over to the sluice I had previously set-up in the stream where there was a good amount of fast running water. My sluice was light weight aluminum about 3-1/2 feet long and one foot wide with green felt on the bottom covered with a sheet of expanded metal. I had positioned the sluice box with a 10 degree drop and placed a few rocks near the entrance of the sluice box to create a funnel which increased the water flow through the sluice. I spent about 30 minutes feeding the gravel material into the sluice.



Then I took a break and snapped some pictures of everyone. They were spread out about 100 yards along the creek. Most of them were finding garnets and pyrite. I found a near-perfect pyrite cube and gave it to Kolton. Katie had found some nice garnets by digging down into the creek.



After my break, I dug another bucket of gravel and ran it through the sluice. At about noon, I began a clean-up of the sluice in two stages - first, I panned the gravel that had collected at the entry of the sluice box. Eureka!! I found four specs of gold and some small garnets and a small, but perfect, crystal of magnetite - which was shaped like two (2) back-to-back pyramids. Then I removed the expanded metal and felt and rinsed it all into my gold pan. I then panned out this material and found a few more specs of gold. It was a long process, but definitely faster than individually panning the two (2) buckets full of gravel a single pan at a time.



I did not have a chance toward the end of the trip to see what everyone found this time. The two boys seemed quite happy panning for garnets and collecting rocks that looked like houses. Rich had found zero garnets until almost noon, when he shifted to a new location out in the stream and found an area full of nice garnets. Katie's discovery of garnets attracted about six (6) of our group to join her. Alton seemed happy just observing all the activity. The weather certainly cooperated as we had a very pleasant day for panning in the creek.



Spreading the Word about our Rock Show

There was a short announcement in the local county paper about a "geology program" for kids about the rocks that could be found in Charles County at the Potomac Branch of the library. It was during a weekday afternoon from 2:00 to 3:00 pm. Thinking that it might be a good opportunity to pass out some of our Rock Show fliers, I called the library and asked if the program was for adults as well. Their answer – no, it was just for kids. I decided to go anyway. I printed out 20 copies of the small flyer size and headed across the county to that library branch.

When I arrived, I spotted a little kid with an adult near the base of a tree outside the library. The kid was searching in the mulch around the tree for pebbles. Incredible! Thinking "our club has so much to offer", I really felt sorry for the child trying to find rocks in that mulch. I spoke with the adult lady and asked where the geology program was being held and who oversaw it. She was very helpful and said the program was in the meeting room just inside the front door on the right and the person to see was "Sarah". I went in and was amazed to see a large room very full of kids with their Moms. Actually, I was blown away. Meet the Flint Stones by Ralph Gamba

When it comes to collecting minerals, flint never seems to be high on one's list. For the most part, it does not have the beauty of agate. But when the opportunity comes to collect flint, especially in a classic location, it can't be passed up.

The opportunity came for Mary C. and me (Ralph G.) when we headed to Michigan via Columbus, Ohio. We stopped for the night in Zanesville, Ohio. A quick look at the maps showed we were near Flint Ridge, in Glenford, Ohio, famous for flint. Flint is the Ohio state gemstone.

Flint is a type of cryptocrystalline quartz. Wikipedia defines cryptocrystalline as "a rock texture made up of such minute crystals that its crystalline nature is only vaguely revealed even microscopically in thin section by transmitted polarized light."

We discovered the web site for Flint Ridge Ancient Quarries and Nature Preserves and saw that they were open on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays during the summer. It was Friday so we visited the preserve. The museum opened at 10 AM, but they had trails where we walked until the museum opened. The trails wandered around many pits that were used to quarry the flint. No flint was exposed because of leaves and dirt cover. Admission to the museum was \$3.00, but seniors get a onedollar discount. We saw beautiful examples of flint and how Native Americans used the flint as tools and weapons. The museum was built around one of the pits that were used for quarrying the flint. Collecting was not permitted at the site.

We talked with museum personnel, and he showed us that the flint was heat treated to bring out its vibrant colors. The museum had nice samples for sale, and we purchased one for each of us. We obtained information about where we could collect flint for ourselves. A local farm allowed collecting for \$7.50 per person and \$0.50 a pound.

While returning to the car, we chatted with a family who was going to the museum. They mentioned that they lived nearby, and the flint was scattered all over the area. We didn't want to spend too much time collecting, so we decided to stop

along the road to see what we could find. We found some nice examples of flint. Each of us collected about a dozen samples of various sizes. One of Mary's specimens had quartz points on one side. Two of Ralph's specimens had crystal lined vugs. Figure 1 shows the specimen with a ½ inch vug. Figures 2 and 3 show more specimens of Flint Ridge flint. Figure 4 shows heat treated flint. The heat treatment brought out the colors of the flint. Yes, we did have a "Yabba Dabba Doo" time collecting flint.
